MESSAGE ONE

The Change described

- I. Overview: Jesus causes our life to change when we receive Him and grow in Him. The best way to describe that drastic change is to study the difference between the old man and the new man as described in the New Testament. Seeing God's new creation in His new man helps us answer questions like:
 - a. Do I change from my old life to the new automatically, or do I need to intentionally choose to change?
 - b. What does the new life look like?
 - c. Why does my old life sometimes feel so powerful when I fall backward to the old?
 - d. How do I grow in my new life?
- II. We will see that living in the new man
 - a. Is based on Christ's death on the cross, where he created the new man
 - Involves leaving behind our old life—putting off the old man, which is being corrupted because it is connected to the old creation
 - c. Involves putting on a new life—putting on the new man, which is being renewed continually by God
 - d. Is intentionally maintained by us being continually taught in Christ to put off the old and to put on the new. On the one hand, putting off the old man and putting on the new man are finished works in us. On the other hand, we must continually apply these as we are taught in Christ.
 - e. Is empowered by Christ and our present, real experience of "learning Christ"
 - f. Involves continually being renewed in the spirit of our mind

- g. Brings us into God's profound work of ending the old creation by sowing it into the ground and growing the new creation in resurrection
- Is not individualistic, but involves community where there is no Greek or Jew, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free etc.
 Here, Christ is all and in all.
- i. Results in us treating others in an entirely new way: with forgiveness, love, kindness, and words that build up and give grace
- j. Results in a community where members allow the word of Christ to dwell in them richly so they can teach and encourage one another as all seek to honor the Holy Spirit who is sealing them
- Is living in a realm where we thank God the Father, enjoy the peace of Christ the Son, and seek not to grieve the Holy Spirit as we build up fellow believers in a harmonious life in one body

III. Central verses

MESSAGE TWO

Christ Created the New Man on the Cross

- I. Overview: We were once far off, separated from Christ, and strangers to God. Christ brought us near and ushered us into the new man through His death. Now we enjoy access to the Father with other believers. Now we are of God's household and are ready to be built up as a dwelling place of God in Spirit.
- *II.* The story of the creation of the new man in Christ on the cross shows us the following.
 - a. We were once far off, strangers to God's covenants.
 - b. We have been brought near in the blood of Christ.
 - *c.* On the cross, Christ broke down every barrier and created us in Himself into one new man.
 - d. Now we all have access to the Father in one Spirit through the Son.
 - e. We are now of God's household and fellow citizens with the saints.
 - f. We now can be built upon the apostles and prophets as God's dwelling place in spirit.

III. Central verses

MESSAGE THREE

The Old Creation vs. The New Creation

- I. Overview: The purpose of this message is to see the difference between the old creation and the new creation. The first creation was made by God, headed up by Adam, and was corrupted by sin. It is expressed today as fallen humanity (which includes corrupt society) and is characterized by the human soul. God's new creation is created by God according to the image of Christ. It is continually being renewed and is defined by spirit. It is expressed in a new living among believers who are full of virtues and the living word of God, as well as honoring the Holy Spirit. The old creation and new creation are two realms, which are theologically profound, and at the same time, experientially simple.

- b. The new creation is what grows after the things of the old creation are "sown," just like a grain of wheat dies in the ground and grows into the new plant. Elements of the old creation, created by God and corrupted by sin, are sown into the ground so that, in resurrection, the new emerges incorruptible and immortal.

MESSAGE FOUR

The New Man is a New Realm, a Renewed Existence, and includes a New Community

- I. Overview: This message explores details of the new realm of the new man in the new creation.
 - The new man is created after the likeness of God and is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator.
 - b. The new man is created by God in righteousness and holiness.
 - c. The new man is always being renewed, meaning that we are always growing into the experience. We never fully arrive, but rather we must continually grow in knowledge, which is in true experience.
 - d. The new man is corporate (together), involving relationships with other people based on Christ in them and all being Christ.
- II. The new man is a new realm and new community in contrast to the old realm and old society.
 - a. Created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness
 - i. God made a realm, called the new man, which is a community in resurrection living a new life.
 - ii. Righteousness indicates the right living before God and between others.
 - iii. Holiness indicates that the entirety of the new man is set apart to God, even filled with God, because only God is holy.
 - b. Being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator

- i. Being "renewed" indicates that the new man is continually in the renewing process.
- ii. "In knowledge" indicates that this involves our understanding and the understanding of those witnessing the testimony.
- iii. "After the image of the creator" indicates how the new man is according to the image of the corporate new man that God is creating in resurrection.
- c. In the new man there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all.
 - i. There are no longer natural distinctions between people in the new man.
 - ii. Christ is all the members.
 - iii. Christ is in all the members.

III. Central verses

- a. ²⁴and to put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness. Ephesians 4:24
- b. ¹⁰and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. ¹¹Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all Colossians 3:10-11

MESSAGE FIVE

The Intentional Living in the New Man

- I. Overview: This message will talk about how to live in the new man. We will find that it is intentional, but not in a way one might think where a person concentrates on not doing the old and on doing the new. It involves learning Christ. It requires us to be taught in Christ to put off the old and put on the new. It demands that we be renewed in the spirit of our mind. It requires that we are taught the profound fact that reality or truth is in Jesus. When our efforts are focused on these things, then the living in the new man is an outflow.
- II. Living in the new man involves our intentional choice of deepening our relationship with Christ
 - a. Paul does not charge the believers simply to remember that they are the new man and to do good.
 - b. Instead, he writes about how they have learned Christ, been taught in Christ, and charges them to be renewed in the spirit of their mind. These experiences allow them to put off the old and put on the new. This pattern shows us that living in the new man and growing in that life is intentional, practical, daily, and can become a habit.

III. We must learn Christ

- a. This is not merely to learn about Christ or to learn what Christ did.
- b. To learn Christ is to grow in an experiential union with Him.
- c. When we learn Christ, we must understand and experience how vast He is. He is the last Adam and the Second Man. He is the Head and body, He is the Alpha and Omega, and He is the eternal One, the Savior, the

Lord, and the resurrected One. Learning Him is to know Him in union with Him.

- IV. We are taught in Him to put off the old and to put on the new
 - a. The more we are taught in Jesus Himself the more we can truly experience putting off the old and putting on the new.
 - b. When we are taught in Him, we understand the place of the old creation, the new creation, and our participation in these realms.
 - c. Putting on is the same Greek word as putting on clothes (Matthew 6:25) and is used to describe putting on immortality (1 Corinthians 15:53-54). It is to put on the realm of the new man in the new creation, which includes a new living and a new community.
 - d. Putting off is laying aside the old realm of the old man. In Ephesians "putting off" is the same Greek word used for laying garments at the feet of Saul (Acts 7:58). In Colossians "putting off" is the same Greek word for how the spiritual rulers and authorities were stripped off when Jesus was on the cross (Colossians 2:15).
- V. We must be taught in Him (Christ) as the truth is in Jesus
 - a. Truth is the reality of God and all His eternal works, including His works in the old creation and the new.
 - b. As we learn the truth that is in Jesus, we understand how the reality of all things of God are in Christ.
- *VI.* A key to putting on the new is to be renewed in the spirit of our mind
 - a. The spirit is key as our source of this experience
 - b. The mind is crucial because we must be conscious of the change in order to live it out

c. This renewal is a continual process, as indicated by the present tense of the infinitive "to be renewed."

MESSAGE SIX

The Wonderful "Together Life" of the New Man Lived out in the Church Life

I. Overview: In this message we wish to see what the relationships with others look like in the new man. These involves the truth, the Spirit, peace, God's word, words thats build up and give grace, being members one of another, singing, teaching one another, bearing one another, and forgiving one another. The community in the new man is a beautiful, "together" existence that is powered by the Christ we learned and the Spirit we do not grieve. This wonderful existence is possible, because of God's great work of ending the old creation and growing His new creation. Our participation is possible because we lay aside the old man and put on the new man.

II. In the new man

- Our words are true, upbuilding, and full of God's thoughts as revealed in His word.
 - We speak truth because we are members one of another.
 - ii. We speak words that build up and give grace, and that do not corrupt.
 - iii. We let the Word dwell in us richly, teaching and admonishing one another in wisdom.
- b. Our feelings are virtuous.
 - i. We are angry without sinning.
 - ii. We let go of bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor, slander, and malice.
- c. Our relationships with others are upbuilding and inspired by God's work in Christ. (see next page)
 - i. We are kind and tenderhearted.

- ii. We forgive one another as God in Christ forgave us.
- iii. We put on compassionate hearts, kindness, meekness, and patience.
- iv. We bear with one another, forgiving each other as the Lord forgave us.
- v. We put on love, which binds us in harmony.
- d. We thank the Father, treasure the peace of Christ, and seek not to grieve the Spirit.
 - We give thanks to the Father through Jesus Christ.
 - ii. We allow the peace of Christ to rule in our hearts, as we are in one body.
 - iii. We don't grieve the Holy Spirit who sealed us.
- e. We work honestly, having lives of singing and thankfulness.
 - i. We give no opportunity to the Devil, especially in our anger.
 - ii. We work honestly so we may share with the needy.
 - iii. We sing songs, hymns, and spiritual songs in thankfulness to God.
 - iv. We do everything—both words and deeds—in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.
 - v. We thank the Father through Christ in everything.

Colossians 3:5–17 (ESV)

OBSERVATIONS

- 1. On the two words translated "new," neos and kainos
 - a. Ephesians: the new (kainos) man who is renewed (ananeoo)
 - i. 2:15 new (kainos) man
 - ii. 4:23 is being renewed (ananeoo) in the spirit of your minds and to put on the new (kainos) man
 - b. Colossians: the new (neos) man who is renewed (anakainoo)
 - i. 3:10 put on the new (neos) man, which is being renewed (anakainoo)
 - c. The 'old nature' (v. 22) is to be put off, and Christians are to *be renewed*. Greek has two adjectives for new: *kainos*, which means new in the sense of fresh and distinctive, and *neos*, which means new in the sense of young. (Tyndale)
- 2. "Old" in all cases is the word palaios
- 3. On "put on" and "put off"
 - a. Ephesians: put off is apotithemi, put on is endyo. Both are Aorist Middle Infinitives.
 - b. Colossians: put off is apokdyomai; put on is endyo. Both are Aorist Middle Participles.
 - c. On put on, endyo in both Colossians and Ephesians
 - i. is also used in 1 Corinthians 15:53-34—this perishable must put on (endyo) immortality
 - ii. Also frequently used for putting on clothes, as in Matthew 6:25 and 27:31
 - d. On put off
 - i. Apokdyomai in Colossians, is only used one other place, in Colossian 2:15 where it refers to Christ stripping of the authorities

 ii. Apotithemi in Ephesians is commonly used for laying someone in prison (Mathew 14:3) and laying aside encumbrances (Hebrews 12:1) and laying garments at the feet of Saul (Act 7:58)

4. On to put off and to put on

- a. There is a debate on whether this is an accomplished fact or something we do
- b. My consideration.
 - i. Ephesians says "as we were taught in Him...to put off....and put on." It seems here that to put off and to put on are actions we are taught in Jesus. This seems like a more active, intentional choice on our side, which has to be applied frequently in our life. We have been taught in Jesus to put off...and put on. (Note: this uses the word "apotithemi" for put off, the far more common word)
 - ii. Colossians is much more matter of fact, "Do not lie....seeing that you have put off....and have put on...." This seems more like a finished fact. The verbs are Aorist Middle Participles, meaning that they emphasize the action (aorist) with not much comment on whether or not it is continuing now, and indicate that we had a part in the doing of this work (middle).
 - iii. Conclusion: Colossians emphasizes the finished work begun at our belief; Ephesians emphasizes our learning to live in the finished work.
 - iv. Interesting caveat: in both cases we still have to exercise to "put on" many things describing the community life to allow a virtuous spirit-filled life to emerge from our living. In both cases we must

also "put to death" our earthly members, or "no longer walk," indicating that an action must be taken to leave our old life.
